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# Bullfinch Blanket <br> Crochet Version Tips \& Tricks 

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This document contains important information on gauge and special techniques used in the crochet version of the Bullfinch Blanket. Read carefully before beginning this project.

## MATERIALS

## Scheepjes Limited Edition Mega Whirl

(60\% Cotton, 40\% Acrylic; 666g/2998m)
400 (coral, grey, blue) $\times 1$ yarn cake
See Tips \& Special Techniques below when using standard
Scheepjes Whirl
3mm crochet hook
Stitch markers

## ABBREVIATIONS (UK)

[ ] number of sts on given row
blo back loop(s) only: work st(s) through back loop(s) only
ch chain(s) or chain stitch(es)

## dc double crochet

dc3tog double crochet 3 sts together to decrease by 2 sts:
(insert hook in next st/space, yoh, pull up loop) 3 times, yoh, draw through all loops
pm place stitch marker
rep repeat
RS right side
sk skipped
sm stitch marker
$\mathbf{s t}(\mathbf{s})$ stitch(es)
WS wrong side
yoh yarn over hook

## GAUGE/TENSION

Each Square measures approx. $10 \times 10 \mathrm{~cm}(4 \times 4 i n)$, before blocking
Refer to Schematic 1: Gauge Weight throughout to ensure you do not run out of yarn
Use this info to make gauge swatch

## SWATCH INSTRUCTIONS

Begin using yarn from centre of yarn cake for each Square. SQUARE 1
Ch52.
Row 1 (RS) 1dc in second ch from hook (sk ch does not count as st throughout), 23dc, dc3tog, pm in dc3tog, 24dc, turn. [49 sts] Pm in previous row to mark RS of work.
Row 2 (WS) Ch1 (does not count as st throughout), 1dc blo in each st until 1 st before sm, dc3tog blo, pm in dc3tog, 1dc blo in each st to end, turn. [47 sts]
Rows 3-24 Rep Row 2, decreasing each row by 2 sts. [3 sts]
Row 25 Ch1, dc3tog blo, ch1 (does not count as st throughout), fasten off. [1 st]
Note: this swatch forms Square 1 of Blanket.

## MEASUREMENTS BLANKET

Approx. $100 \times 140 \mathrm{~cm}(391 / 2 \times 55 \mathrm{in})$, after blocking

## GAUGE/TENSION NOTES

## Squares

The size of each Square is approx. $10 \times 10 \mathrm{~cm}(4 \times 4 \mathrm{in})$ (before blocking) and weighs 4.7 grams on average; however, Squares with a base chain, i.e. (reps of) Square 1, 2 or 3, are heavier. See Schematic 1: Gauge Weight to discover what your Blanket should weigh after a certain number of Squares.

After working 10 Squares, your Blanket should weigh 50 g . If you find that your gauge is significantly larger than indicated, try changing your hook to a 2.75 mm or 2.5 mm size, otherwise you may not have enough yarn to complete the Blanket. Tip: weigh your Blanket at regular intervals, e.g., after 4 Squares, to make sure that you are still on gauge.

Schematic 1: Gauge Weight

## Border

After working all 117 Squares to the given gauge, you will have approx. 115 g of yarn left. Each round of the Border uses approx. 7 g of yarn when worked to the same gauge. If you have significantly less yarn left, work fewer reps of Border - Round 1.

After completing the final round of the Border there is approx. 6 g of yarn left. If you happen to have enough yarn left to work another round, feel free to do so. If you don't have enough yarn to work all the Border rounds, you may stop earlier (Border will then be less wide).


The Blanket will measure approx. $76 \times 112 \mathrm{~cm}$ ( $30 \times 44$ in) before the Border and before blocking. This is because the diagonals of the Squares pull the Blanket inward. Blocking the Blanket at the end will both make it larger and flatten out this wobble.

## SCHEMATIC NOTES

The Blanket is made from 117 Squares in a layout of 9 Squares wide and 13 Squares high. The schematic shows the order in which the Squares need to be worked. Start at Square 1 and work them in the order given. There is a right-handed and left-handed schematic; use the one applicable to you. The Row 1 edge of Square 1 forms the bottom-right corner when crocheting right-handed or bottom-left corner when crocheting left-handed.

## TIPS \& SPECIAL TECHNIQUES

## Whirl Colour Gradient

This Blanket is made from a single, Limited Edition Scheepjes Mega Whirl. However, you can also use 3 standard Scheepjes Whirl yarn cakes to make the Blanket. If you are using 3 Whirls, alternate which one you use to achieve a similar gradient effect to the samples made using Mega Whirl. In other words, make Square 1 from Whirl 1, Square 2 from Whirl 2 and Square 3 from Whirl 3. Then, start over again, so Square 4 is from Whirl 1, Square 5 from Whirl 2, Square 6 from Whirl 3, and so on and so forth. Begin using all Whirls in the same way, working always either from the centre or the outside, whichever you prefer.

For those using the Scheepjes Mega Whirl, to make the Blanket as shown, start making the Blanket from the inside of the yarn cake. If you prefer, you can also start on the outside of the Mega Whirl; the Border will be the light colour from the inside of the cake.

## Using Stitch Markers

If you find it difficult to identify where to start working along the edge of a Square, mark the first stitch of Row 1 and Row 2. Place a stitch marker in the dc3tog, and move it up each row. When the Square is finished, remove the marker.

Place a stitch marker on the front of your work to help you remember which is the RS and which is the WS. Move this marker to the Square you are currently working on so that you always have it in sight.

## Hidden Stitches

When coming to the end of a row, be sure to also work the very last stitch. It can be hidden by the turning chain.

## Yarn Tails

When working away yarn tails, do this in such a way that you connect adjacent Squares to prevent holes forming in the corners between Squares.

## Blocking

The Squares (and Blanket) will be a little wobbly due to the decrease along the diagonal of the Squares; the diagonals of the Squares pull the Blanket inwards. Wet blocking the blanket at the end will make it both larger and flatter out this wobble.

## Tassels (optional)

Use any leftover yarn to make tassels for the Blanket. To create a tassel, cut a few equal lengths of yarn from the leftover yarn cake and fold them in half. Using your crochet hook and with the Blanket front facing, insert your hook between stitches in the final Border round from back to front, pick up the loop of the folded strands, pull the loop through to the back of the Blanket, then pick up the strands and thread the through the loop. Pull to secure tassel.
